

Lail Vineyards: A Chronology	
1842:	Gustave Ferdinand Niebaum is born August 30, 1842, in Helsinki, Finland.
1868:	Gustave Niebaum arrives in San Francisco with a cargo of furs worth more than \$600,000 and becomes a partner in the Alaska Commercial Company.
1879:	Gustave Niebaum, having amassed a personal fortune in excess of \$10 million, buys the Inglenook farm and an adjoining four-hundred-forty-acre farm.
1882:	Inglenook crushes its first vintage of 80,000 gallons of wine. Niebaum purchases 712 additional acres from five neighbors to add to his Inglenook estate.
1889:	Inglenook wine receives an award for "purity and excellence" at the Paris Exposition
1907:	John Daniel, Jr. is born (great nephew of Gustave & Susan Niebaum).
1908:	Gustave Niebaum passes away at his San Francisco home on August 5, at the age of 66. Winemaking ceases for several years.
1914:	John Daniel, Jr. is raised by his great aunt, Susan Niebaum, after the death of his mother.
1933:	John Daniel, Jr. reopens Inglenook following the repeal of Prohibition.
1936:	John Daniel, Jr. becomes owner and managing director of Inglenook.
1940:	Robin Daniel is born (daughter of John Daniel, Jr.)
1941:	The 1941 Inglenook Cabernet Sauvignon made by John Daniel, Jr. earns a reputation as one of the best wines ever made.
1946:	Inglenook acquires Napanook Vineyard in Yountville.
1964:	John Daniel, Jr. sells Inglenook to Allied Grape Growers.
1966:	Robin Daniel marries Jon Lail at her home on the Inglenook estate.

Erin Lail is born (daughter of Robin and Jon Lail).

1969:

1970: John Daniel, Jr. passes away.

1972: Shannon Lail is born (daughter of Robin and Jon Lail).

1974: Robin Daniel Lail becomes Executive Director of the Volunteer Center of Napa County.

1977: Robin Daniel Lail takes a position as personal assistant to Robert Mondavi, her father's protégé.

1981: Robin organizes the first Auction Napa Valley, the industry's wildly successful annual auction which will go on to raise more than \$170 million to support nonprofit organizations in Napa County.

1982: Robin co-founds Dominus Estate with Christian Moueix.

1983: Robin co-founds Merryvale Vineyards with Bill Harlan, where she serves as president for ten years.

1991: Robin meets Philippe Melka, who was interning at Dominus, after graduating from the University of Bordeaux.

1995: Robin sells out of her partnership at Dominus Estate. This same year, Robin, Erin, Shannon and Jon Lail launch Lail Vineyards, and Philippe Melka becomes the winemaker.

1996: The Lail Family acquires Mole Hill Vineyard on Howell Mountain

1997: Robin sells out of her partnership at Merryvale Vineyards.

1998: Lail Vineyards releases its first wine, the 1995 J. Daniel Cuvee Napa Valley red blend.

2014: Lail Vineyards receives its first 100-point score from renowned wine critic Robert Parker for its 2012 J. Daniel Cuvée Cabernet Sauvignon.

2018: Lail Vineyards receives its second 100-point score from The Wine Advocate

– this time from reviewer Lisa Perrotti-Brown – for its 2016 J. Daniel Cuvée
Cabernet Sauvignon.

2019: Robin Lail is named the U.S. Representative to <u>The Porto Protocol</u> and donates 10% of online sales of Blueprint wines to organizations deep in the fight against climate change.

2020: Lail's 2017 Blueprint Cabernet Sauvignon is named the #1 Wine of the Year by Wine Enthusiast.

2021: Robin's role with The Porto Protocol shifts from U.S. Representative to Ambassador.

2021: Lail Vineyards receives their third 100-point review, this time from critic Jeb Dunnuck, for 2018 J. Daniel Cuvée.

2021: Wine-Searcher names Lail's Georgia Sauvignon Blanc one of the best Sauvignon Blancs in the world. Lail was the first U.S. winemaker to make a Graves style Sauvignon Blanc.

2022: Lail Vineyards releases 2019 J. Daniel Cuvée, the wine's 25th vintage.

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
